About the School of International Arbitration

The "SIA" was established in 1985 under the auspices of the Centre for Commercial Law Studies at Queen Mary University of London and it was the first international arbitration university institute in the world. It was the vision of Professor Sir Roy Goode and Professor Julian Lew that brought the SIA to life and laid the foundations of its success.

Its aim was, and still is today, to promote advanced teaching and produce excellent research in international arbitration and international dispute resolution generally. To achieve these objectives, SIA offers an extensive programme of international arbitration courses including LLM modules, postgraduate diplomas, an online LLM, executive education and one of the largest specialist PhD programmes in the world. Today, SIA is widely acknowledged as the world's leading postgraduate teaching and research centre on international arbitration.

Since its establishment, more than 3,000 students from more than 100 countries have graduated from SIA and more than 50 PhD students have successfully completed their doctoral studies. Many of our graduates are now successfully practising arbitration around the world as advocates, in-house counsel, academics and arbitrators. Others serve governments, international organisations, or work for major arbitration institutions.

From one academic member at the outset, SIA now has currently nine permanent professors, senior lecturers and lecturers, a strong network of part-time and visiting academic members, and campuses in London and Paris. Although SIA is physically located in the centre of legal London, our faculty delivers courses all over the world, in addition to our London and Paris-based flagship programmes.



About the School of International Arbitration

Apart from its academic staff, SIA involves several high-profile practitioners in its teaching programmes. This adds crucial practical experience to academic knowledge and analysis. Further, SIA has close links with major arbitration institutions and international organisations working in arbitration. It also offers consulting services and advice to governments and non-governmental agencies that wish to develop their knowledge of arbitration, as well as training for lawyers in private practice, in-house counsel, judges, arbitrators and mediators. One of our key programmes has been the 14 empirical surveys we have conducted since 2006 which are a major resource for further arbitration research and quoted in many events globally.

The strength of SIA lies in the quality and diversity of its students and the desire of the SIA's staff to shape our students' academic and professional development. However, the work of SIA extends well beyond the classroom and plays a leading role in the evolution of arbitration as an academic subject. Speakers



Alan Redfern

Alan Redfern started his professional career at Freshfields, where he became the firm's first litigation partner. Alan was then joined by Martin Hunter. In addition to their professional activities, they wrote the First edition of Redfern and Hunter, published in 1986. Alan and Martin also became friends of Julian Lew, which led to Freshfields becoming sponsors of the celebrated annual Q.M.C/ Freshfields' lecture on international arbitration. Alan retired from Freshfields in 1995, joined the Bar and, as a member of One Essex Court, developed a substantial practice as an international arbitrator. He also devised the much-loved 'Redfern schedule'. Alan retired from the Bar in December 2000, but he continues to write about international arbitration and to contribute as an author to Redfern and Hunter. Published by Oxford University Press, this is now in its Seventh edition with a considerable national and international following.



Ana Vermal

Ana Vermal is a partner in the Litigation Department and co-head of the firm's International Arbitration Group.

Ana Vermal is a seasoned quadrilingual lawyer with extensive experience in both common law and civil law. Professor Andrea K. Bjorklund

Andrea K. Bjorklund is a Full Professor and the L. Yves Fortier Chair in International Arbitration and International Commercial Law at McGill University Faculty of Law. She is the General Editor of Arbitration International and is the General Editor for investment for the Journal of International Dispute Settlement as well as a member of the Investment Treaty Forum of the British Institute for International and Comparative Law. In addition to her academic work, she acts as arbitrator and expert in both investment and commercial arbitrations. She was appointed to the ICSID Panel of Arbitrators by the Government of Canada and is on the roster of several other arbitral institutions. A citizen of both Canada and the United States, she holds a J.D. from Yale Law School, an M.A. in French Studies from New York University, and a B.A. in History and French from the University of Nebraska. In June 2025 the University of Vienna awarded her an honorary doctorate.



Audley Sheppard KC

Audley Sheppard KC is a full-time arbitrator with extensive experience of major disputes arising out of infrastructure and energy projects, and international trade and investment. He has been appointed under the LCIA, ICC, HKIAC, SIAC, DIAC, SCCA, LMAA, UNCITRAL and ICSID Rules.

Audley is a member of Twenty Essex, London, before which he was a partner of Clifford Chance, where he was the co-Head of the International Arbitration and International Law groups.

Audley is President -elect of ICCA. He is a former Chair of the Board and a Vice-president of the Court of the LCIA, Member on the ICC International Court of Arbitration and Arbitration Commission, Rapporteur of the ILA Arbitration Committee, and Co-chair of the IBA Arbitration Committee. He is Chair of the Board of Sport Resolutions, and a Director of BIICL.



Professor Bernard Hanotiau

Bernard Hanotiau is a member of the Brussels and Paris Bars. Since 1978, Bernard Hanotiau has been involved in several hundred international arbitration cases (commercial and investment) in all parts of the world, in all sectors of industry. Mr. Hanotiau is professor emeritus of the law school of Louvain University, Belgium. He is visiting professor at the universities NUS in Singapore and EPCL in Shanghai. He is member of the ICCA Advisory Board and member of the ICC Institute. He is a member of the Court of Arbitration of SIAC and a member of the HKIAC International Advisory Board.

He is the author of Complex Arbitrations: Multi-party, Multi-contract & Multi-issue (Kluwer, The Hague, 2006, second edition 2020, third edition in preparation). In March 2011, Mr. Hanotiau received the GAR Award for Arbitrator of the Year. In April 2016, he also received the Who's Who Legal Award for Lawyer of the Year in Arbitration.



Clément Fouchard

Clément focuses on international commercial and investment arbitration. He has 20 years' experience advising on major litigation and arbitration proceedings.

Clément has regularly acted for French and international clients in arbitrations seated across the globe and has particular experience in complex disputes in the energy and infrastructure, construction, mining, defense and distribution sectors.

Crina is member of the Board of the SCC Arbitration Institute, as well as the chair of the Institute for Transnational Arbitration Academic Council.

Crina is the Director of the Diploma Course on International Commercial Arbitration of the Chartered Institute of Arbitrators.

Crina has been appointed as arbitrator in numerous arbitrations under the rules of the ICC, LCIA, DIAC, SIAC, SCC, FAI, VIAC, CAM-CCBC etc., and has acted as expert and counsel in various international commercial and investment arbitrations.

Crina is the managing editor of Kluwer Arbitration Blog, and member of editorial boards of prestigious journals and book series in the field.



Professor Debbie De Girolamo

Professor Debbie De Girolamo joined Queen Mary University of London in September 2012 where she teaches in the LLM programme at the Centre for Commercial Law Studies and also in the LLM programme in Paris, in particular Alternative Dispute Resolution and Negotiation Theory and Practice. Debbie is also the Academic Director of the Postgraduate Diploma Course (taught by distance learning) in International Mediation and also for the Postgraduate Diploma Course in International Dispute Resolution (Mediation). Prior to joining Queen Mary as a full-time lecturer, she was the Course Convenor for a combined Queen Mary and University College London LLM ADR course at CCLS and she taught Introduction to the Legal System at the LSE.

Debbie is a qualified Barrister and Solicitor in Ontario Canada where she practised prior to coming to England to commence her doctoral studies at the London School of Economics and Political Science. While in Canada, she obtained her LLM in Alternative Dispute Resolution from Osgoode Hall Law School and began teaching mediation, negotiation and general dispute resolution courses at law schools in Ontario and also for professional development programmes while continuing her law practice. She also trained as a mediator and became a community mediator in Toronto.

Debbie has written in the area of negotiation and mediation. Her book, The Fugitive Identity of Mediation: Negotiations, Shift Changes and Allusionary Action was published by Routledge in Spring, 2013.



Professor Diane Desierto

Diane is a full tenured Professor of Law at Notre Dame Law School and Professor of Global Affairs at the Keough School of Global Affairs. She directs the LLM Program in International Human Rights Law and founded the Notre Dame Law School Global Human Rights Clinic. At Keough, she is a Faculty Fellow across five Institutes and Co-Principal Investigator of the Reparations Design and Compliance Lab.

An award-winning scholar and counsel, Desierto has authored or edited 8 books, over 70 law review articles, 35 book chapters, and numerous reports for the UN, ASEAN, EU, and ADB. Her work has been cited by international courts, arbitral tribunals, and the Supreme Court of the Philippines.

She serves on several editorial boards, was for 12 years on the European Journal of International Law board, and has held fellowships and visiting professorships worldwide. In practice, she appears before the ICJ, ICC, PCA, SIAC, and the Inter-American Court of Human Rights, and is a listed arbitrator at the BVI Arbitration Centre. She also served as UN Chair-Rapporteur of the Expert Group on the Right to Development.



Dominic Spenser Underhill

Dominic is an English solicitor, arbitrator, and an Honorary Professor at Queen Mary.

He is a former Visiting Professor at the University of Turin, where he still lectures annually. When he was the head of international arbitration at Mayer Brown in London and Paris, Dominic began to accept arbitral appointments.

He co-founded Spenser Underhill Newmark LLP in 2006, to develop his career as an arbitrator and where he now sits as an arbitrator full time. From 2009 - 2024, Dominic also sat as an Adjudicator for the Solicitors Regulation Authority. He is a former Chair of the Solicitors Compensation Fund, and presented to SRA investigators on legal professional ethics.

He has advised other finance-based professions on professional ethics.



Dominique Hascher

Dominique Hascher an independent arbitrator with extensive experience across leading international arbitration institutions, including the ICC, CAS, ICSID, and others.

He served as a Judge of the Supreme Judicial Court of France and held the position of General Counsel and Deputy Secretary-General of the ICC International Court of Arbitration from 1990 to 1998.

A Fulbright Scholar, he studied law at Paris II and Harvard University. He is currently a member of the panel of arbitrators at the Hong Kong International Arbitration Center (2024) and the Court of Arbitration for Sports (2024), and serves as an Appointing Authority under the UNCITRAL Rules, designated by the Permanent Court of Arbitration (2017, 2024). He also contributes to the International Council for Commercial Arbitration (ICCA) as an Advisory Board Member (2020).

He has taught extensively, serving as Adjunct Professor of Law at the University of Paris I (2001–2015) and as Visiting Professor at University College London (2005) and the University of Texas, Austin School of Law (2007). He has delivered lectures at the Hague Academy of International Law (1999 and 2022).

He served as President of the French Society of Comparative Law (2015–2019), and has been recognized as an Honorary Bencher of Gray's Inn (2004) and a member of the American Law Institute (2007).



Eduardo Silva Romero

Eduardo Silva Romero is a founding partner at Wordstone, specialising in international commercial and investment arbitration, with a historic focus on disputes involving States and State-owned entities.

Eduardo is recognised as one of the world's most in-demand arbitrators, having acted in over 180 international commercial and investment cases under a wide variety of institutional rules.

Eduardo has advised and advises on arbitration matters conducted under the auspices of ICC, ICSID, PCA, LCIA, ICDR and SCC, as well as in ad hoc proceedings under the UNCITRAL and EDF arbitration rules.

Eduardo is a former Deputy Secretary General of the ICC International Court of Arbitration and former member of the ICC Court, and is currently the Chair of the ICC Institute of World Business Law.

Eduardo has published several articles, books and chapters on international arbitration, including its lectures on "Legal Fictions in the Language of International Arbitration" delivered at The Hague Academy of International Law in 2019.

He also lectures on investment arbitration and international contracts at Sciences Po in Paris, international arbitration at Paris II University, international commercial arbitration involving States and State-entities at the MIDS in Geneva, and is Professor Emeritus at the University of Rosario in Bogotá.



Greg Falkof

Greg Falkof is a Partner and Head of the International Arbitration Practice at Mishcon. He has a particular focus on the effective resolution of disputes in the energy, natural resources, international trade, transport, engineering, infrastructure and construction sectors, as well as international investment arbitration and public international law.

Greg has represented both claimants and respondents in international arbitrations, including large complex disputes worth billions of dollars, and before major arbitral institutions, as well as ad hoc arbitration proceedings. He also regularly sits as an arbitrator, either as a party-appointee or as sole arbitrator in expedited or standard proceedings, and he has accepted appointments from the ICC Court of Arbitration and the London Court of Arbitration (LCIA).

Professor Julian Lew KC

Professor Julian Lew KC is a well-known name in the field of international arbitration, having practised as an academic, counsel and arbitrator.

Professor Lew was the founder and has been the head of the School of International Arbitration, Centre for Commercial Law Studies, Queen Mary University of London since its creation in 1985. He has written and lectured extensively on many different aspects of international arbitration.

He is now a full-time arbitrator in international commercial and investment disputes at Twenty Essex. Before 2005, he was a partner and for some years the head of the international arbitration practice group at a leading international law firm.

Professor Lew has been involved with arbitrations involving many areas of commercial and investment contracts. They include claimed breaches of investment treaty commitments and disputes regarding purchase and sale of corporate entities and assets, joint ventures, oil and gas exploration, development and production agreements, research and development and promotions of pharmaceutical and chemical products, mining and concession arrangements, distribution and agency contracts, and intellectual property licensing contracts. Many of the arbitrations have had a state or state entity as a party.



Professor Kun Fan

Kun Fan (PhD summa cum laude, University of Geneva; LLM, NYU) is Associate Professor at UNSW Law and Justice, specializing in international dispute settlement and comparative law.

She has held academic positions at McGill University and the Chinese University of Hong Kong, and visiting appointments at the Harvard Yenching Institute, University Paris Panthéon-Assas, the Singapore International Dispute Resolution Academy, and WilmerHale. Author of Arbitration in China: A Legal and Cultural Analysis (Hart Publishing), she has published widely in leading international journals.

She has served as counsel, legal expert, secretary for the arbitration tribunal and arbitrator in a number of international arbitrations and domain name disputes, and oversaw over a hundred ICC arbitrations while working at the Secretariat in Paris. Called to the New York Bar, she is a Domain Names Panelist for CIETAC, HKIAC, ADNDRC, an arbitrator for BAC, SHIAC, eBRAM, Zhuhai Arbitration Commission, and is an accredited mediator of HKMAAL.



Dr Laurence Shore

Laurence Shore practises international arbitration, as counsel and arbitrator, at Seladore Legal's Milan branch office, where he is a partner. He previously practised law in London, New York City, and Washington, DC.

Laurence is a co-author of International Investment Arbitration: Substantive Principles (Oxford University Press, second edition, 2017), and "The Witness Statement Problem in International Arbitration", New York Law Journal (28 February 2025). Larry's law degree is from Emory University, where he was editor-in-chief of the Emory Law Journal.

He has a doctorate in American history from Johns Hopkins University. Larry is a member of the New York, District of Columbia, and Virginia (inactive) Bars, and he is a solicitor for the Senior Courts of England and Wales.



Professor Loukas Mistelis

Professor Loukas Mistelis is the Clive Schmitthoff Professor of Transnational Commercial Law and Arbitration at the Centre for Commercial Law Studies, Queen Mary University of London and an International Arbitration Partner at Clyde & Co LLP. Loukas is an acknowledged authority on international dispute resolution and investment treaty law.

In 2006 he was listed as one of the "leading lights in international arbitration" and since 2007 he is listed on the Who's Who Commercial Arbitration and since 2017 as Global Elite Thought Leaders in International Arbitration.

He has been listed in the Legal500 International Arbitration Powerlist since its inaugural year (2019). He is also listed as Tier 1 Arbitrator by Chambers and Partners. He has been also part of the team which won the 2022 GAR Award for best innovation, the Cross-Examination Moot and has also won the GAR Award for the best lecture in International Arbitration is 2014 and has been shortlisted several times since.

He acts as a counsel and expect in complex arbitration cases and regularly sits as an arbitrator with most major arbitral institutions. His substantial arbitration experience covers ad hoc and ICC, ICSID, LCIA, DIAC, VIAC, PCA, UNCITRAL, GCC, SCC, Swiss Chambers and Moscow cases and also Emergency Arbitrator proceedings under ICC and DIAC Rules.

Loukas is a member of the Board of Trustees of CRCICA, member of the SCCA Court and member of panels of most major arbitral institutions. He is also a widely published author and Deputy Director of the QMUL LLM in Comparative and International Dispute Resolution .



Dr Maria Fanou
