

HATEVER may have been the emotions of the authorities, humbler members of this Medical College have not, of recent years, been overkeen that freshmen in-boarders should arrive. qualm we welcome every freshman to our midst. No one, we believe, will be more satisfied with a large increase in our numbers than those responsible for the finances of the Students' Union.
