A one-day international conference organised as part of an AHRC-funded collaborative project between Queen Mary, University of London and the V&A Museum of Childhood.

- How have children's lives been shaped by global processes and events, both in the past and present?
- How do children understand and imagine their place within the wider world? How does this vary over space and time?
- How have children's lives been shaped by experiences of empire, migration and conflict?
- How do children engage with the wider world through participation and citizenship?

About the AHRC funded research on 'The Child in the World'

The Child in the World project is a five-year collaboration between Queen Mary, University of London and the V&A Museum of Childhood focused on researching the lived experiences of London children between 1870 and the present day. The research is being undertaken by three PhD students working on distinct Collaborative Doctoral Awards. They are supervised by staff in the School of Geography and the School of Languages, Linguistics and Film at Queen Mary, and by staff at the V&A Museum of Childhood.

How to find us


Underground Bethnal Green, Tube, Central Line, Zone 2. Less than 5 minute walk. Please note there is no lift access at this station.
