Part 1: Preliminary items

Welcome and apologies

2024.94 The Chair welcomed the members and **noted** the apologies received.

Part 2: Matters for Discussion

Principles of Assessment Design

(SE2024.33)

2024.95 Senate **considered** the proposed Principles of Assessment Design.

- 2024.96 Senate **noted** that in the last academic session , Senate had approved the Principles of Programme Design [m2023.035-036] which had been led by QM Academy. The Principles of Assessment Design complemented the Principles of Programme Design and aligned with the assessment and feedback strategy. The Principles of Assessment Design had been fully endorsed by the Education Quality and Standards Board (EQSB)
- 2024.97 Members wished to note that the implications of having a maximum of two assessments for a 15-credit module may require further consideration. The concern had been raised because it was noted students are generally keen to receive as much feedback as possible, and enforcing fewer assessments could reduce feedback opportunities and negatively impact student satisfaction. Senate members noted that the Faculties had been reviewing the guidance and considering the optimum mechanisms for students to obtain formative feedback.
- 2024.98 Senate **approved the** Principles of Assessment Design, noting that they should be applied consistently to all new and existing programmes and modules. Members noted that the status of the Principles of Assessment Design was that of a required reference point for academic staff, and that the principles would be incorporated into the assessment policy framework in due course.

Annual Report on Student Casework (2023-24)

(SE2024.34)

- 2024.99 Senate **considered** the Annual Report on Student Casework (2023-24).
- 2024.100 Senate **noted** the significant improvement in addressing the historic backlog of appeals with less than 20 appeals carried over from the previous academic year. Disciplinary cases had increased during 2023-24, although these cases were often challenging, the increase was a positive indicator of students' increased trust and engagement with Queen Mary's reporting process.
- 2024.101 Senate **noted** that in line with sector-wide trends, misconduct cases involving Artificial Intelligence (AI) had increased.
- 2024.102 Members discussed the use of AI in assessment in light of the Annual Report on Student Casework (2023-24):
- i. The need to provide further training for staff and students on AI literacy had been identified as a priority, as members noted variability in AI detection and assessment across modules, dependent on a number of variables including the marker's familiarity with AI and disciplinary differences. The need to ensure that students would be equipped with relevant AI-related skills had been considered essential to align with evolving employer expectations and workforce demands. Members noted that a foundational layer of knowledge of core topics would equip students in understanding and evaluating AI responses.
 - ii. The Integration of AI into assessments would require a nuanced approach rather than a blanket policy. Colleagues were

- encouraged to collaborate with the Queen Mary Academy and the Centre for Excellence in Artificial Intelligence in Education.
- iii. Members noted that there was the potential for inequality with regard to access to AI systems, with economically advantaged students having access to more advanced AI tools.
 - iv. It was clear that students were keen to make effective use of AI for their learning, and QMSU noted that of a survey of 700 students, 41.5% of students had declared AI use for preparation and learning for exams.
 - v. The report had not categorised misconduct data by faculty for students enrolled in transnational education programmes. It was noted that this would be an opportunity to refine data collection processes to enhance support for students in their engagement with AI.

2024.103 Senate **noted** the need for clear detection and clarity on appropriate AI use and misuse and governance processes and measures, and to which degree oversight of these processes should be managed. Minor detection of AI may be considered as poor academic practice rather than misconduct. In effort to mitigate any bottleneck of misconduct cases involving AI through a central team, members agreed further discussion on local disciplinary measures for minor cases may be the way forward.

2024.104 Senate **noted** that it would be possible to report on the number of academic misconduct cases involving AI for future years; inappropriate use of AI would be a category for case classification, although it was noted that it would not be possible to report on cases involving AI in combination with another category of academic misconduct, only the principal offence category would be recorded.

2024.105 Senate **noted** that the discussion on AI had been useful and that it would be beneficial to have a further deep-dive discussion on AI at a future meeting of Senate.
